

# You're What Makes Us Special

What makes the SPCA special? It's the people. Like our employees and volunteers, some of whom have been with the SPCA for 15 to 20 years! It's our diverse, animal-loving community — including friends like you. Your generosity helps us maintain a scope of programs and services unlike any other shelter in the United States.

As you know, we care for homeless dogs and cats — but this is far from all. We also rescue rabbits and other small pets, horses and other barn animals, pet birds, reptiles, and sick and injured wildlife. This year alone, the wildlife center treated more than 160 species! Caring for such different needs requires adequate space and equipment, staff expertise and support, and can take days, weeks or even months. Providing care for just one horse can last well over a year and easily cost thousands of dollars or more.

Our Veterinary Clinic is also very busy, offering low- or no-cost spay and neuter surgeries as a community service to drive down the number of stray pets and accidental litters.

And we educate thousands of children annually, offer dog training classes, rescue pets from neglect and abuse, and provide emergency services to help animals and pet owners impacted during disasters. We enjoy special partnerships with Meals on Wheels, Salinas Valley State Prison (where inmates train SPCA dogs!) and Central Coast College. None of this incredible work would happen without your generosity.

## You Gave Senior Pets Like Nibsy a New Leash on Life!

#### Nibsy's former life is shrouded in mystery,

When Nibsy arrived at the SPCA, our staff discovered she had a microchip, but her previous owner had been deceased for some time with no next of kin. The address associated with the microchip led to a condemned house.

Nobody knows how long Nibsy was on her own, wandering the streets — but because of your outstanding kindness, she found love and safety at our shelter.

"Her personality won over our entire staff," chuckled Dr. Kate Riley, SPCA Veterinarian. "Despite everything she had been through, she was really happy, friendly and sweet with everybody. We all fell in love with her cute little face!"

After weeks of care, a much-needed grooming

and significant dental work, SPCA staff posted Nibsy's picture on social media. It only took three hours for Nibsy to find her next loving home.

"I saw her photo online and went 'oh my, she's so cute!'," says her adopter, Josephine. "She snores like crazy and she loves having her picture taken. I just love her."

"It's an absolute myth that senior dogs don't get adopted," Dr. Riley adds. "At SPCA Monterey County, seniors like Nibsy can be just as popular as puppies. We never hesitate to help them, and we provide lifesaving procedures before adoption like mass removals and dentals. Your compassion means pets like Nibsy get second chances at love."

# More Room for Life and Love: Thank You for Helping Momo


Just look at her picture: It's easy to see that Momo is a tiny yet mighty kitten! But when she arrived at the SPCA all alone, her uphill battle with health had only just begun.

Our skilled veterinary team first noticed that her chest was smaller than an average kitten's due to a congenital defect called pectus excavatum. She was placed with a loving and experienced foster volunteer to monitor her symptoms and, while she was active and happy, Momo would tire quickly and pant heavily during play.

"We see many kittens with a curved sternum, but Momo also had a curved spine, and they curve towards each other," says Dr. Kate Riley, SPCA Veterinarian. "It made her lung space significantly smaller and threatened her quality of life."

The SPCA veterinary team was determined to help little Momo fight for a better, healthier future. With time and careful consideration, Dr. Riley attempted a procedure that would help clear more room for Momo's lungs.

We surgically sutured a splint onto Momo's breastbone and placed small weights on the splint to gently pull the curvature out to a more normal position.

SPCA staff examined Momo weekly to perform minor adjustments, assess improvements and gently tighten the sutures when needed. It took six weeks for her to fully recover, but the procedure more than doubled the space for her lungs. She spent one more week with her foster family after we removed her splint to ensure everything stayed in place, and then Momo was officially ready for adoption.

### This Owl Can Fly High All Because of You!



We use your donations to help all kinds of animals — including this Great Horned Owl!

This Great Horned Owl arrived at the SPCA stuck in a bind. He was found tightly wrapped in wire, and his right wing drooped unnaturally. Because of you, we could give him the care he desperately needed.

Our skilled SPCA rescue team provided fluids and pain medication, carefully wrapped his injured wing and took radiographs to ensure he didn't have any broken bones. After five days of rest, our team moved the owl to an outdoor enclosure where he showed us he could fly, but he fatigued easily and needed more rehabilitation before he could survive in the wild.

After a few more weeks of gentle care, the owl was cleared for release, and he could fly away strong and free. "Thank hoo" for all your support in this owl's recovery!

### Your Support Helped Set a New Record!



Just imagine how many more animals would need shelter and care if not for the spay and neuter services you helped provide.

Your support helped the SPCA Veterinary Clinic do something incredible. Just last year, we set a new record, spaying and neutering 6,900 pets! That means thousands fewer homeless and neglected animals in our community, and many more happy, healthy and cherished family pets.

1,454 of those treated were feral cats, spayed or neutered at absolutely no cost — all because of you!

We also provided grants to local rescue partners to help them alter more pets outside of our clinic walls. This additional funding and support meant another 595 pets won't bring more puppies or kittens into our community without enough homes to sustain them.

Thanks to you, our Veterinary Clinic has been Monterey County's leader in fighting pet overpopulation since 1976. With your partnership, our skilled veterinary team has the tools and resources needed to save even more lives and make a difference with compassionate, loving care.
